Parable of the Life-Saving Station

Why do we do what we do? Sometimes we lose our sense of purpose.

On a dangerous sea coast where shipwrecks often occur, there was once a crude little life-saving station. The building was just a hut, and there was only one boat, but the few devoted members kept a constant watch over the sea, and with no thought for themselves, went out day and night tirelessly searching for the lost. Some of those who were saved and various others in the surrounding area wanted to become associated with the station and gave of their time and money and effort for the support of its work. New boats were bought and new crews trained. The little life-saving station grew.

Some of the members of the life-saving station were unhappy that the building was so crude and poorly equipped. They felt that a more comfortable place should be provided as the first refuge of those saved from the sea. They replaced the emergency cots with beds and put better furniture in the enlarged building. Now the life-saving station became a popular gathering place for its members, and they decorated it beautifully because they used it as a sort of club. Fewer members were now interested in going to sea on life-saving missions, so they hired lifeboat crews to do this work. The life-saving motif still prevailed in the club's decorations, and there was a liturgical life-boat in the room where the club's initiations were held. About this time a large ship wrecked off the coast, and the hired crews brought in boat loads of cold, wet and half-drowned people. They were dirty and sick. The beautiful new club was in chaos. So the property committee immediately had a shower house build outside the club where victims of shipwrecks could be cleaned up before coming inside. At the next meeting, there was a split among the club membership. Most of the members wanted to stop the club's life-saving activities as being unpleasant and a hindrance to the normal social life of the club. Some members insisted upon life-saving as their primary purpose and pointed out that they were still called a life-saving station. But they were finally voted down and told that if they wanted to save lives of all the various kinds of people who were shipwrecked in those waters, they could begin their own life-saving station. So they did.

As the years went by, the new station experienced the same changes that had occurred in the old. It evolved into a club, and yet another life-saving station was founded. History continued to repeat itself, and if you visit that sea coast today, you will find a number of exclusive clubs along that shore. Shipwrecks are frequent in those waters, but most of the people drown.

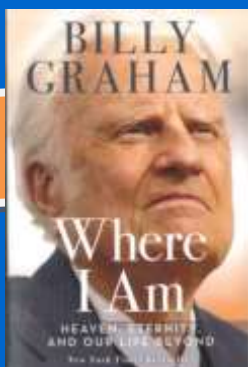

Pioneer Missionaries/abhs archives

Born in 1788, Adoniram Judson was one of the first missionaries sent from the United States to spread the Good News of the Jesus Christ.

In June of 1810, Judson and three other aspiring missionaries met with the Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions, newly organized by the Congregationalists. The Board advised them to 'wait for the openings and guidance of Providence.'

While he was waiting, Judson met a deeply devout schoolteacher named Ann Hasseltine. When the call came from the Board, Ann and Adoniram quickly married. The following day, February 6, 1812, Adoniram Judson, Samuel Newell, Samuel Nott, Gordon Hall, and Luther Rice were ordained as 'Christian Missionaries to carry the Gospel of Salvation to the Heathen.'

On February 19, the cargo ship Caravan sailed out of Salem (Massachusetts) harbor with the Judsons and the Newells on board. Thus started their four-month journey to India.

In anticipation of needing to defend the Congregational practice of infant baptism before British Baptist missionary William Carey, the Judsons studied their Bibles. The result was the Judsons' conviction that believers' baptism was correct. Upon arriving in India, they asked for baptism by immersion, although they knew that meant breaking ties with the Congregationalists who were supporting them.

The political situation prevented the Judsons from remaining in India. They eventually found themselves on a boat to Burma. On July 13, 1813 Ann and Adoniram finally arrived in the land that would be their home. Their companion, Luther Rice, had also become persuaded of the Baptist position on baptism and returned to the United States to work with Baptists congregations to support the mission in Burma. Because of his work, the first Baptist mission board was formed in 1814.

Ann and Adoniram learned to speak Burmese, and Adoniram spent years studying the language in order to translate the entire Bible into Burmese. Ann wrote a catechism in Burmese.

Life was not easy for New Englanders in this tropical climate. There were no other English-speaking people, no western conveniences, and no tolerance for religious diversity. Their children died young, and Adoniram and Ann suffered frequent illnesses. Adoniram was accused of being a spy and was imprisoned by the king of Burma.

Thanks to Ann's care, Adoniram was eventually released. Ann died of exhaustion shortly thereafter.

August 3-11, 2019

The ABC Emergency Services Center was created in the basement of the First Baptist Church of the Northern Hills in Deadwood to help those who became stranded due to injury, abandonment, or mechanical breakdown. The local law enforcement and social services agencies were encouraged to contact our workers when they ran across people in need. The distribution of thousands of posters and brochures helped others find the ESC on their own. (NOTE: Since 2011 we have been based at First Baptist Church of Rapid City.) Volunteers from both regions spend all or part of the week helping, feeding, transporting, and counseling the dozens of individuals who come to the ABCESC for assistance.

Throughout the week calls come in at all hours of the day and night from churches, police and rescue workers, and individuals, wanting us to help men, women and children in need. Rapid City has become a strategic base of operations as transportation to the hospitals, rescue mission, bus station, and airport is provided.

Volunteers don't need to be motorcyclists, but ought to have a heart for evangelism and a willingness to serve.

Women volunteers are especially needed due to the large percentage of women and children that we end up assisting. If you can come for all or part of the week we can find a job for you

Pray for Jeni Pedzinski serving young tribal women in Thailand who are at risk for human trafficking.

Jeni serves on the leadership team at the New Life Center Foundation (NLCF) in Chiang Mai, Thailand. Established in 1987, the New Life Center serves young ethnic minority (tribal) women who are at risk for, or survivors of, human trafficking, forced labor and sexual abuse. NLCF residents are provided with shelter, education, vocational and life skills training and legal assistance. Special therapeutic activities for survivors include comprehensive art, dance and music therapy and individual counseling. With degrees in development and Christian theology, Jeni provides administrative support, Christian discipleship and financial literacy training to NLCF staff and program beneficiaries. In collaboration with the NLCF's senior staff, she writes grants, oversees the monitoring and evaluation of program outcomes and assists with public relations.

Jeni writes - I continue to work full-time to support the local staff on the front lines of trafficking prevention and after-care for survivors of exploitation and trauma. It is my great joy to work alongside these capable, committed women. Showing compassion by turning toward (not away) and reaching out to those who are hurting is our costly privilege.
